In 2011 the legislature of Alabama passed the harshest anti-immigrant bill in American, and the governor of Alabama signed it into law. One legislator said that the purpose of the law was to make undocumented residents "so miserable that they self-deport."Faith leaders in Alabama came together in unprecedented ways to oppose the mean-spirited law.

They organized rallies and marches attended by thousands of people. Four bishops in three denominations (Episcopal, Methodist and Roman Catholic) sued the State of Alabama. Congregations conducted workshops about hospitality and about justice in the treatment of immigrants. Pastors preached sermons. Clergy held press conferences. Laity and clergy wrote letters to newspapers throughout Alabama. Faith leaders met with legislators. Faith groups raised money to pay for ads on television. A small group of faith leaders engaged in a sit-in in the Capitol building in Montgomery. This book is a visual and written record of public protests by Alabama faith leaders against a law that violated the consciences of Jews, Christians, and Muslims alike.
